IOWA YOUTH CODE OF ETHICS

Youth are expected to be sincere, honest and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, club and the entire youth program. All adults involved with the youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any youth who breaks the Code of Ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the Code of Ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this and future exhibitions including the Iowa State Fair and other county, state or regional exhibitions.

Youth agree to follow these guidelines:

- 1. I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (such as sewing, cooking, refinishing, etc), care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support me, not do it for me.
- 2. All exhibits will be a true representation of my work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete your exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
- 3. I will treat all people and animals with respect. I will provide appropriate care for animals.
- 4. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All food exhibits will be safe to exhibit and for judges to evaluate. Other exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
- 5. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers, and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications, and be free of violative drug residue.
- 6. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the fair or exhibition, only the Official Fair Veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
- 7. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show, and have penalties assessed against the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian by the management of the fair or exhibition.
- 8. I will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
- 9. I will follow all livestock health requirements for this fair or exhibition, according to the state health requirements as printed in the Premium Book of the fair or exhibition. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request from the management of the fair or exhibition.
- 10. By my entering an animal in this fair or exhibition, I am giving consent to the management of the fair or exhibition to obtain any specimens of urine,

saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian to prove otherwise.

11. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this Code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this fair or exhibition I will accept any disciplinary action taken by the management of this fair or exhibition for any violation of this Code of Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition without recourse against the fair or exhibition.

12. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.

13. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in 4-H and FFA events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco or drug use. I agree to conduct myself in an honest, ethical, and upstanding manner and I understand that disciplinary actions will result if these rules are violated. I understand that I am expected to represent the program in a positive manner. I have read, understand and agree to follow this Code of Ethics, and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition as printed in its Premium Book.

In accordance with Federal law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, this institution is prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, and reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity. (Not all prohibited bases apply to all programs.) Program information may be made available in languages other than English. Persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication for program information (e.g., Braille, large print, audiotape, and American Sign Language) should contact the responsible State or local Agency that administers the program or USDA's TARGET Center at 202-720-2600 (voice and TTY) or contact USDA through the Federal Relav Service at 800-877-8339. GENERAL RULES

- 1. Entries are open to qualified 4-H'ers and FFA members. Qualifications are:
 - a. Members must be enrolled by May 1, 2021 in one of the following Delaware County 4-H Clubs (Aces, Bear Creek Levis-N-Lace, Buffalo Belles & Boys, Coffins Grove Guys & Gals, Delaware Hustlers, Earlville Clever Clovers, Hazel Green Hawks, Honey Creek Helpers, Hoptown Hurricanes, Milo Livestock, North Fork Kit Kats, North Fork Wildcats, Petersburg Achievers, Prairie Clovers, OR Nifty Needlers) OR be an FFA member in West Delaware, Edgewood-Colesburg or Maquoketa Valley Schools OR be an FFA member maintaining a primary residence in Delaware County.
 - b. Any Beckman Catholic FFA member who is not a Delaware County resident and exhibited at the 2018 Delaware County Fair will remain eligible to exhibit until the completion of the calendar year of graduation from high school.
 - c. If a youth is not a resident of Delaware County and is not enrolled in West Delaware, Maquoketa Valley or Edgewood Colesburg Schools and only claims FFA membership in one of these school chapters through the participation of online classes, this FFA member is not eligible to participate at the Delaware County Fair.
 - d. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H projects or FFA enterprises from which the exhibit comes.
 - e. A member becomes ineligible to exhibit upon completion of the calendar year of graduation from high school. Mid-year graduates are eligible to participate the summer immediately following high school graduation
 - f. Age divisions are (based on September 15, 2020)

Juniors: 4th through 6th grades

Intermediates: 7th and 8th grades

Seniors: 9th through 12th grades

2. ALL county fair exhibitors MUST be YQCA, certified before they can exhibit projects in the following categories: Beef, Swine, Dairy (cattle & goat), Sheep, Poultry, Meat Goat, and Rabbit.

3. Fair Entry Procedure:

a. Animals for departments 2 - 12 must be identified in 4-H Online by midnight May 15. If this is not an option for you, contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15. Beef, Dairy, Dog, Horse, Goat, Pet, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine Show Entry must be completed online in FairEntry on or before July 1st. A Check-in Form will be turned in at fair check-in for ALL livestock departments. Livestock showmanship entries will be made during the respective shows.

Agronomy, Communications, and Clothing Activities entries must be entered online in FairEntry by 4:30 p.m. on May 28, 2021.

All Conference exhibit projects in Animals, Agriculture, and Natural Resources, Creative Arts, Family & Consumer Sciences, Personal Development, Science, Engineering, and Technology, Kits & Crafts, and 4-Hers in Action departments must complete online entry on or before July 1st. All exhibits must be entered into the online system FairEntry.

NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ALLOWED.

- b. Entry fees will be paid for every entry in a class for which premium may be received. Entry fees for Conference Exhibits - \$0.35; Beef Cattle and Dairy Cattle - \$1.50; Horse and Pony - \$1.00; Sheep, Goats, and Swine - \$0.75; Dog and Agronomy - \$0.50; Rabbits, Poultry, and Pets - \$0.25; extra swine, goat, and sheep pens (see rule 2d below) - \$1.00. Entry fees will not be paid in advance. Those exhibitors who receive premium payments will have entry fees deducted from their premiums; other exhibitors will be billed for the entry fees after the fair.
- c. Swine, Sheep and Goat pens: Each swine exhibitor will be assigned two pens if space allows. The superintendent will assign a sufficient number of pens to sheep and goat exhibitors based on the number and type of exhibits. As a general guideline, no more than four market animals or two breeding sheep will be in one pen. Swine exhibitors with four entries, and sheep or goat exhibitors whose pens are filled to capacity in the judgment of the superintendent may request extra pens for a fee

- of \$1.00 per pen. Extra pens will be provided only on a space available basis.
- 4. Each exhibit must be the work of the member during the current year. The exhibit is to be an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of a 4-H or FFA project.
- 5. Members enrolled in both a 4-H Club and FFA Chapter must plan and manage separate projects and/or Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) programs. Individuals may have the same area of experience in FFA and 4-H; however, individuals shall not identify, manage, keep records on or exhibit the same animals, plants, etc. in both organizations.
- 6. The Department Superintendents reserve the right to rule on special cases. Appeals can be made to the Delaware County Youth Committee. Any further appeal will be made to a joint committee of the Delaware County Extension Council and the Delaware County Fair Society.
- 7. Exhibits must be in place according to the schedule for each division. NO LATE EXHIBITS WILL BE ACCEPTED. NO EXHIBITS WILL BE ALLOWED TO LEAVE BEFORE THAT DEPARTMENT'S RELEASE TIME. Premium money will be forfeited if any or part of a judged exhibit is removed before release time.
- 8. Awards will be made on the basis of blue, red, and white groupings according to individual merit. There is no extra premium money awarded to purple placings.
- 9. Exhibitors must have exhibitor wristbands for admittance to the fair-grounds from July 13 through July 18. Wristbands are to be worn at all times, not removed and replaced when entering the gate. Exhibitors not wearing wrist bands will be charged admission. Exhibitors who wish to replace wristbands that are lost or missing for any reason will be charged the full price of a new wristband. Broken or damaged wristbands will be replaced free of charge only if the damaged wristband is returned.
- 10. State Fair exhibitors must be in 5th grade as of September 15, 2020. A 4-H member becomes ineligible to exhibit beyond the county level upon completion of the calendar year of high school graduation.
- 11. For security reasons, exhibitors are discouraged from exhibiting items

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- that have special meaning or historical value. The Delaware County Fair management will use diligence to ensure the safety of animals and articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will they be responsible for any loss, injury, or damage.
- 12. Any club that does not show up for their 4-H building hosting assignment and food stand shift will forfeit all premium money for its members. Clubs are expected to be on time.
- 13. APPROPRIATE CLOTHING FOR ALL 4-H EXHIBITORS DURING JUDGING, ASSISTING JUDGES, HOSTING IN THE 4-H EXHIBIT HALL OR WORKING IN THE 4-H FOOD STAND IS THE 4-H UNIFORM.
- 14. SHOW RING DRESS CODE: To assure the favorable appearance of the Delaware County Fair and Livestock Sale the following rules will apply:
 - a. Exhibitors must be dressed in clean, neat, and appropriate attire. Appropriate attire does not include sandals, flip-flops, or hats.
 - b. White shirts, white blouses, or white T-shirts, or T-shirt with the emblem of your youth organization are required for the Junior Fair Show. This includes County 4-H t-shirts, 4-H Club t-shirts, or FFA chapter shirts.
 - c. Representation of any organization other than 4-H or FFA on any apparel or equipment will be illegal in the show ring. (This includes the names or emblems of feed, equipment, livestock breeds or farms.) The



- exhibitor's last name or any other family name shall not be visible on any apparel or equipment while in the show ring.
- d. Gum or candy will not be allowed in the show ring.
- e. Particular attention to the above rules will be given for the showman-ship classes.
- 15a. 4-H and FFA members have a special responsibility to conduct themselves in a manner that upholds the image of their organizations and the Delaware County Fair. WATER FIGHTS AND WATER BALLOONS ARE PROHIBITED. 4-H or FFA exhibitors who engage in unruly acts, vandalism, malicious treatment of livestock, or any other behavior that could cause injury to people, animals or property or disrupts fair activities should be reported to the general superintendent and action will be taken by the review committee on all cases. The review committee will be made up of one representative from the Extension Youth Committee, one member of the Fair Board, an Extension staff member. the 4-H leader or FFA advisor of the individual(s), and the superintendent of the department(s) affected. The review committee will have the authority to penalize 4-H or FFA members who violate these standards. Penalties may include any combination of the following: warning; denial of premiums; ineligibility for any remaining 2021 county fair shows or suspension from exhibiting in subsequent Delaware County Fairs, activities, or the livestock auction; revocation of championships, trophies, or state fair designations already received; or restitution to those who were harmed by the acts. Any appeal of review committee decisions must be made immediately to the fair board, whose decisions will be final.
 - b. In the event it could affect the ability to exhibit the project based on the inappropriate actions of the 4-H and/or FFA member, a minimum of three of the review board can take immediate action. The three must include a member of the Extension staff or the Youth Committee, the department superintendent, and one other.

- 1. Exhibitor is limited to one entry each of corn, soybeans, oats, wheat, hay, and rye. Entries must be completed online in FairEntry by 4:30 p.m. May 28, 2021. Exhibitors cannot change fields or field locations once they have been identified and filed with the Delaware County Extension Office.
- 2. Entries of corn and soybeans will be judged in the field prior to the fair using the following score card:

- 3. Each exhibitor will be mailed a profit statement form after entries are made in May. Corn and soybean exhibitors will also be mailed the scorecard. The top portion of the scorecard is to be completed by the exhibitor prior to field judging. The judge will score in the field, and the card plus the profit/loss statement will be completed and attached to the entry at the fair.
- 4. Exhibitors will prepare a display of: Corn 4 or more stalks; Soybeans 25 or more plants (corn and soybeans are to be planted in two 5 gallon pails in a live condition); Oats & Wheat ½ of a 5-gallon bucket; Hay ⅓ bale. Hay exhibits must consist entirely of the current year's hay. Depending on individual year and date of fair exhibit, requirements may change. Early fairs will require oats or wheat to be exhibited as whole plants. When oats or wheat are exhibited as whole plants, they must be tied in a 3 to 4 inch bundle with two strings.

- 5. Exhibitors are requested to be present during field visits and judging. Participation of the exhibitor during judging is imperative, as only they can truly express their goals and appropriately respond to questions from the judge. If a special condition arises which prevents an exhibitor from participating in field judging at the scheduled time, that exhibitor must contact the Extension office as soon as possible and arrange for either a different appointment time or permission to have a representative participate in the field judging in the place of the exhibitor. If a special condition arises which would prevent an exhibitor from participating in the final judging at the fair, that exhibitor must follow the procedure for requesting a substitute exhibitor under rules 3(b), 3(c), and 3(d) in the Livestock Division-General Exhibit Rules section. Adult leaders or advisers may be present during judging, but may not attempt to influence the judging or discuss the project other than to answer the judge's questions.
- 6. All entries in each class will be judged at the same time. All exhibitors should be present when judging begins at 7:00 p.m.

LIVESTOCK DIVISION GENERAL EXHIBIT RULES

All general rules will apply to this and all departments. Please read carefully.

- 1. All animal and livestock exhibitors must abide by the Code of Ethics as developed by the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and adapted by the Delaware County Fair. Each animal exhibitor and a parent or guardian must sign a statement agreeing to be bound by the Code of Ethics as a condition for entry in departments 2-12.
- 2. ALL county fair exhibitors MUST be YQCA before they can exhibit projects in the following categories: Beef, Swine, Dairy (cattle & goat), Sheep, Poultry, Meat Goat, and Rabbit.

- 3. All animals, including those who attended a weigh-in, must be identified by the exhibitor in 4-H Online by midnight May 15. If this is not an option for you, contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15.
 - a. ANIMALS MUST BE POSITIVELY IDENTIFIED BY AN ACCEPTABLE AND RECOGNIZED METHOD and the identification recorded in 4-H Online or on the Livestock Identification Report Form.
 - b. Livestock Identification submitted after the May 15 deadline will only be accepted under the following procedure:
 - I. The exhibitor must submit a written request to the Delaware County Extension Youth Committee by June 15. The request must explain why the Livestock Identification was not filed on time. The completed Livestock Identification Form must also be submitted.
 - II. The appropriate 4-H leader or FFA advisor will be notified of the request and given an opportunity to comment.
 - III. The Youth Committee will evaluate the merits of each request and determine which requests will be granted. Decisions of the Youth Committee will be final.
 - IV. If a late Livestock Identification Form is accepted by the Youth Committee, the exhibitor will be required to pay a late fee of

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\$5.00 per entry listed on the late Livestock Form.

c. Market beef, market sheep, market goat, and swine exhibitors are responsible for entering the information on their initial weigh-in sheets in 4honline. Animals weighed in under one exhibitor's name cannot be transferred to another exhibitor later than sixteen days after the initial weigh-in. This does not prevent the designation of a substitute showman as provided by fair rules.

4. INELIGIBILITY OF ANIMALS:

- a. Animals changing ownership after being started in a project are ineligible to be exhibited as 4-H or FFA animals for that year.
- b. Any animals offered for sale in an auction or entering the auction gate while an auction is in progress are considered to have changed ownership and are terminated as a 4-H project. Any such animal may not be exhibited again in a 4-H livestock show even if it is bought back by the original owner or if the owner refuses a bid or declares "NO SALE."
- c. Animals which have been previously exhibited at another 2021 4-H or FFA show in another county may not be exhibited at the Delaware County Fair.
- d. All animals and birds must be owned by the exhibitor, or in partnership with an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), and identified to an individual 4-H or FFA member or FFA Chapter. When registration papers are involved, the papers must be in the exhibitor's, parent's, guardian's, or farm name. The only exceptions are in dog obedience or horse classes where the primary emphasis of evaluation is the skill level of the exhibitor; however, the exhibitor must take an active role in the care of the animal and animals must still be identified on the appropriate form.
- e. Dairy project animals may be owned or leased. Please see the Dairy Department for more information on leasing


5. **SUBSTITUTE EXHIBITOR:** All individual exhibits must be shown in the show ring and the sale by the owners with the following exceptions:

- a. Where the exhibitor has more than one animal in a class it is understood that the exhibitor show one of them. The additional animal must be shown by another eligible Delaware County 4-H'er or FFA member.
- b. In case of illness, any boy or girl in the show may substitute another eligible exhibitor to show his/her animal if approved by the Extension Staff, department superintendent, and a member of the Youth Committee.
- c. In the event of 4-H'er or FFA member entering the service after beginning the project year, his/her project may be shown by another eligible exhibitor.
- d. In the event a special condition may arise which would prevent the 4-H'er or FFA member from participating in the show or sale, that

member must submit a written request to the Delaware County Youth Committee by June 15. In case of emergency situation, the request for a substitute exhibitor will be reviewed and decided upon by Extension Staff, the superintendent of the species involved, and a member of the Youth Committee immediately after becoming aware of the special condition.

- 6. SUBSTITUTE ANIMALS: In case an animal becomes sick or otherwise is prevented from being exhibited, after having been duly entered, a substitute animal may be entered provided if it was recorded in 4-H Online or on the Livestock Identification Report for that species by the member making the original entry.
- 7. First and second prize winners in each individual class are eligible to compete for breed or weight division championship providing they exhibit and receive a blue ribbon placing. No second prize animal shall be eligible to rank higher than reserve champion. Only weight division champions in the beef department are eligible to compete for Grand Champion, and no reserve champion will be eligible to rank higher than a Reserve Grand Champion.
- 8. Exhibitors will be required to keep feed, bedding, equipment, etc., in the space set aside for this purpose. Straw bedding is not allowed in the barns. The public alleyways must always be kept open and free from litter, feed, equipment, etc. at all times.
- 9. See the fair program for schedule of judging, deadlines for entering exhibits, and release times.
- 10. Use only the livestock gate on the fairgrounds (gate on Grand Ave.) for bringing in livestock entries.
- 11. To help insure safety of animals and humans, fans must be covered on all sides by material with openings no more than 1/2 inch squares.
- 12. All livestock entries must meet the livestock health requirements printed in this fair book.
- 13. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects of conformation or affecting performance of animals exhibited will be considered as fraud and deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at Delaware County Fair Livestock Shows.
- 14. NO DRUG OF ANY KIND MAY BE ADMINISTERED TO ANY MEAT ANIMAL AT THE DELAWARE COUNTY FAIR. ANY EXHIBITOR WITH ANIMALS REQUIRING MEDICAL ATTENTION FOR ANY REASON WILL GO THROUGH THE STEPS BELOW:
 - a. Notify superintendents for that species of the problem (report to the Extension Fair Office if superintendent cannot be reached).
 - b. Superintendents or Extension personnel will contact a show veterinarian to inspect animals in question.
 - c. Upon diagnosis, veterinarian will determine if treatment is necessary.

- If treatment is necessary owner's veterinarian will be notified to treat unless owner requests show veterinarian to treat.
- d. Animals requiring treatment will be immediately ineligible for further exhibition in the 2021 county fair shows. The veterinarian will determine if such animals should be removed from the fair. Animals will go home or to slaughter depending on treatment and on the species involved.
- e. All animals requested to be removed must be removed immediately upon request by superintendent or veterinarian.
- 15. Market animals must show to be included in the sale and animals must be led only by the exhibitor at the show and sale except when approved under the rules for substitute exhibitors.
- 16. Any exhibitors failing to comply with the rules of the show forfeit any premium won.
- 17. The premium money will be pro-rated to all exhibits receiving premium. The total amount of money to be pro-rated will be determined by the Fair Board.
- 18. If there is a designated trailer parking area for livestock trailers, all livestock trailers will be restricted to park in this area after unloading and during the fair.
- 19. Only approved 4-H and FFA signs are to be hung in the barns and exhib-



- it hall. Under no circumstances will anyone or firm be allowed to place advertising matter upon buildings, fences, or other places on the grounds, except by special permission of the Fair Board and Extension. Nor will anyone be permitted to distribute any advertising at any point outside the space assigned to them.
- 20. Once the animal is sold in the Livestock Auction, the buyer takes ownership. In accordance with Iowa 4-H and FFA rules, sold animals may not be shown at other shows.
- 21. Should an issue arise regarding the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale, members of the Livestock Sale Committee will be called upon to meet and render decisions. The committee includes a representative of the Delaware County Extension Council, a representative of the Delaware County Fair Board, one member each (typically the show superintendent) of the beef, swine, goat, and sheep fair committees, the Delaware County Extension Program Director, a member of the Delaware County Youth Committee, and Delaware County Fair Board Manager.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY AND BIRDS AT THE DELAWARE COUNTY 4-H/FFA FAIR

All animal exhibits and their herds must comply with all relevant state health laws and regulations.

ANY EVIDENCE OF WARTS, RINGWORM, FOOT ROT, PINK EYE, DRAINING ABSCESSES OR ANY OTHER CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS CONDITION WILL ELIMINATE THE ANIMAL FROM THE SHOW.

<u>All</u> animals and/or birds must be inspected upon arrival when unloaded or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian, regardless of whether the exhibitor has obtained a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. If the Fair Board contracts with a veterinarian to inspect exhibits in one or more departments, exhibitors in all animal departments will be assessed a uniform fee per exhibit to pay the costs of providing such veterinary services, to be deducted from fair premiums after the fair. This fee will be based on the actual cost of contracting with fair vets, but will not exceed \$1.00 per exhibit. Any changes in this policy will be announced prior to the fair in the 4-H Family Newsletter or other letters to exhibitors, which will take precedence over these printed rules

Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited. THE DECISION OF OFFICIAL SHOW VETERINARIANS WILL BE FINAL.

We would like to express our appreciation for the official show veterinarians. The animal shows would not be possible without their volunteer help. Veterinary services for the 2020 fair are provided by: Ryan Veterinary Service, Dyersville Veterinary Clinic, Tri-Vet Associates, Inc., Manchester Small Animal Clinic, and the Winthrop Vet Clinic.

SHOWMANSHIP DEPARTMENT

 Champion and Reserve Champion Showman in Junior, Intermediate, and Senior divisions will be selected in all livestock departments, which include: Beef, Dairy, Dog, Horse, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, Swine, and Meat Goat. Grade as of September 15, 2020:

Junior -- 4th through 6th grades

Intermediate -- 7th through 8th grades

Senior -- 9th through 12th grades

- 2. Any junior or intermediate member who has been designated a champion showman in that age division at a previous show must then advance the following year to the next age division showmanship contest even though they have not yet reached that grade as of September 15, 2020.
- 3. Every exhibitor is eligible to enter the showmanship classes for the spe-



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cies they exhibit by entering the ring when the showmanship class is called.

- 4. Exhibitors must show their own animals in the showmanship contest, with the exception of Horse Showmanship.
- 5. Showmanship awards will be judged according to the following scorecard:

Appearance

Attitude

Clipping Cleanliness
Condition Grooming

Presentation of Animals 40 points

Leading, posing, response to direction or direction of ring master, and use of necessary equipment.

TOTAL POINTS 100 points

HERDSMANSHIP

- 1. Each club will be awarded a Blue, Red or White ribbon based on the appearance of their livestock exhibit area. (No special credit given for decorations.)
- 2. Judges will be selected to check the exhibits twice daily during the fair week.



- 3. Extension Office Staff will provide stall cards.
- 4. . All stalls or pens are to be cleaned and everything removed when animals are released from the fairgrounds. Individual premiums will be withheld if stalls or pens are not clean after release of livestock.
- 5. The following scorecard will serve as a basis for the judging:
 - a. Condition and cleanliness of animals.
 - b. Neatness, cleanliness and courtesy of club members.
 - c. Cleanliness of stalls and alleys.
 - d. Signs and stall cards.

2a. MARKET BEEF

1. Entries are open to market beef projects weighed and identified on or before January 1, 2021. The project shall actually start after October 1, 2020 and before January 1, 2021. All market beef projects must entered into 4-H Online by exhibitors prior to February 1, 2021. All Market Beef exhibits must be entered online in FairEntry by July 1. A Market Beef Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in. Market Beef exhibitors are also required to complete a drug affidavit stating their projects comply with all state and federal regulations involving proper drug usage

- and all Food & Drug Administration, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Food Safety Inspection Service, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations.
- 2. Of the maximum six (6) head weighed in, a maximum of four (4) head may be shown if one is the opposite sex of the other three.
- 3. No animal will be allowed to exhibit which has its permanent incisor teeth up and in wear. Animals may be "mouthed" to determine age if necessary.
- 4. Show classification: all breeds and crossbreds will show together breaking the classes only by weight. A separate class for market heifers will be provided.
- 5. A separate dairy beef class will be held with its own champion and reserve champion. Dairy beef are restricted to animals that are dairy straight bred or crosses of dairy breeds. The animals must have predominately dairy characteristics of the following dairy breeds: Holstein, Guernsey, Jersey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, and Milking Shorthorn. Animals in question will be entered in other beef classes.
- 6. Rate of gain data will be printed on a place card to be worn by the exhibitor in the show ring.
- 7. All animals will be entered in the rate of gain contest. Rate of gain will be computed from date of weigh-in to the date of final weight.
- 8. A rate of gain of 2.25 pounds per day will be required for a steer to place 1st or 2nd in its class. For market heifers, the requirement is 2.00 pounds per day.
- 9. All market individual beef projects are to be weighed in at check-in on Tuesday, between 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. All calves must have 4-H or FFA county ear tag in place when they arrive at the fair. If a tag is lost, it must be reported to the Extension Office and replaced prior to the fair. Cattle from a pen of three are NOT eligible to be shown in the individual classes except under the provisions of section 2 of the Junior Cattle Feeders rules.
- 10. Weight classes will be established so that approximately an equal number of calves will be shown in each class. The weight classes will be determined after weigh-in. All Champions and Reserve Champions from each weight division of steers, heifers, dairy beef, and bred and raised beef will compete for overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
- 11. All county raised market animals are eligible for the County Raised Trophy. (County raised means the animal was born in Delaware County).
- 12. No drugs, artificial stimulants, or relaxants are allowed.
- 13. The Livestock Auction will be held Saturday morning, July 17, 2021. Market beef must not receive feed or water after 11:00 p.m. the day before the sale. Calves will be weighed the day of the sale, and can receive food and water after being weighed.

Exhibitors caught watering or feeding calves after the 11 p.m. deadline and before the sale weigh-in will be docked \$.10 per pound at the sale. You will be notified by a committee of the beef board that you were caught. There will not be an announcement during the sale that a particular calf was docked, but the sale clerk will be instructed to deduct \$.10 per pound from the buyers invoice. Owners of livestock must stay with animals until loaded by the buyers.

- 14. The sale order for the beef sale will be determined as follows:
 - a. All exhibitors will have an opportunity to sell one animal before those with two animals can sell their second animal. However, an exhibitor who is selling two Champion or Reserve Champion calves may sell both of them before any non-champion calves are sold. Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Champion, and Reserve Champion calves WILL count as an exhibitor's first round calf. Exhibitors will designate the order in which they plan to sell their animals at the time of weigh-in at the fair. Actual sale order will be drawn by extension office personnel.
 - b. The following procedures will be followed <u>unless the exhibitor notifies</u> <u>the Extension fair office no later than 5:00 p.m. Thursday:</u>
 - -- Grand Champions, Reserve Grand Champions, Champions, and Reserve Champions that were designated for sale at the weigh-in will be **automatically** moved in the sale order so that they are sold at the beginning of the sale. If the exhibitor had designated a second calf for sale, the remaining calf will be sold in the latest position that was drawn for that exhibitor's calves.
 - -- If a Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Champion, or Reserve Champion is withdrawn from the sale after having been designated for sale, the exhibitor may replace it with a calf that had not been previously designated for sale if the exhibitor notifies the Extension office no later than 5:00 p.m. Thursday, that he or she wishes to sell a different calf. If the exhibitor had designated a second calf for sale that calf will be sold in the **earliest** position that was drawn for that exhibitor's calves, and the newly designated calf will be sold in the second position that was drawn.
 - -- Grand Champions, Reserve Grand Champions, Champions, or Reserve Champions that were NOT designated for sale at the weigh-in will NOT be sold unless the office is notified otherwise. If the exhibitor notifies the Extension office no later than 5:00 p.m. Thursday, that he or she wishes to sell a Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Champion, or Reserve Champion calf that had NOT been previously designated for sale, the exhibitor must also at that time designate which of his or her calves will be removed from the sale to comply with rule 15(c) below. The exhibitor's remaining calf will be sold in the latest

- position that was drawn for that exhibitor's calves.
- -- As of 5:00 p.m. Thursday, the sale order will be finalized and no further changes in the sale catalog will be made.
- c. A maximum of two calves may be sold in the sale.
- d. If an exhibitor has shown a third or fourth halter animal, this animal cannot be sold at the auction. The exhibitor may either sell it on the open market or take it back home.
- 15. Special note to exhibitors going through cattle gates once they are in place: Make sure gates are secured before leaving the gate area. This is to prevent spectators from being injured by falling gates. If you open any gate, make sure it is closed after you pass through it to prevent livestock from leaving the barn or wash area.
- 16. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), Delaware County 4-H club leader or FFA advisor, current Delaware County 4-H or FFA member or pre-approved person upon written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th. Exhibitors who violate the grooming rule will not be eligible to place higher than third in their class. Violations discovered after the class was judged, including after the show, will be stripped of any class placing above third place including loss of trophies and loss of premium. A second violation during the same year or subsequent years by the exhibitor will be reviewed by the department superintendent, extension staff member and representative of the Extension Youth Committee and punishment could include suspension from exhibiting in subsequent Delaware County Fairs.
- 17. Except when they are to be shown in the showring or going to the designated grooming area between the beef barn and swine barn on show day, or in the gated area designated for walking cattle and as a grooming chute area on the north side of the beef barn, no beef exhibits (market or breeding) may be removed from the beef barn and water tank area at any time between check-in on Tuesday and release time on Wednesday night and Friday, without advance permission from either the fairboard manager or the county program director or designee.
- 18. Grooming chutes may be set up on the north side of the beef barn in the gated area on Thursday morning (show day) and must be removed Thursday evening.

2b. BREEDING HEIFERS

- 1. Heifers shown in this division cannot be shown in any market beef class or sold in the Livestock Auction.
- 2. Entries in heifer classes are open to grade and purebred heifers. Exhibits must be identified in 4-H Online by midnight May 15. If this is not an option for you, contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15. All Breeding Beef exhibits must be entered online in FairEntry by July 1. A Breeding Beef Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in.
- Purebred heifers must meet the standards of the appropriate breed association. Registration papers must be submitted to the Delaware County Extension Office by May 15 or the exhibit will be shown in the crossbred class.
- 4. Animals must be born between January 1, 2020, and December 31, 2020.
- 5. No more than 4 breeding heifers may be shown by an exhibitor.
- 6. Superintendents will divide heifer classes by age and established so that approximately an equal number of calves will be shown in each class.
- 7. All heifers will be judged from the standpoint of breed characteristics, type, quality, and conformation with future usefulness as a breeding cow considered. Judge may also consider weight per day of age.
- 8. Must have a minimum of two heifers in a breed to hold the class. Additional purebred beef heifer classes may be added if two or more are entered. If not the heifer will be shown in the other breeds class.
- 9. All breeding heifer entries must report to the scales between 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, July 13, to check in their entries. Breeding heifer entries may be weighed for the exhibitor's information, if desired. Breeding heifers must be tattooed at this time if an exhibitor would like to exhibit in the cow-calf contest the following year.
- 10. Grooming chutes may be set up on the north side of the beef barn in the gated area on Wednesday afternoon (show day) and must be removed Wednesday evening.
- 11. All Breeding Heifers will be released and sent home immediately following the completion of the Breeding Beef show. Exhibitors will be expected to clean out their stall space after the completion of the show.

Breeding Bred and Raised must be identified in 4honline by May 15 and entered in FairEntry by July 1 as bred and raised. These animals will ONLY be allowed to show in this class.

2d. JUNIOR CATTLE FEEDER/PEN OF 3 PROJECT (Advanced Cattle Feeding)

1. Entries are open to Junior Cattle Feeder projects weighed-in and identified

- on or before January 1, 2021. The project shall actually start after October 1, 2020, and before January 1, 2021. All Junior Cattle Feeders exhibits must be entered in FairEntry by July 1. A Pen of 3 Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in.
- 2. A group of three (3) head may be entered in this class with a limit of two (2) groups per member. Four calves may be weighed for each group at the December weigh-in but only three head may be shown at the fair. If an exhibitor weighs in four (4) head for a Junior Cattle Feeder project AND fewer than six (6) individual exhibits, one member of the group of 4 may be designated for possible entry as an individual market beef exhibit. This animal may then be shown either as part of a Junior Cattle Feeder project OR as an individual exhibit, but not both. This animal must be designated at the December weigh-in.
- 3. All Junior Cattle Feeders Project Exhibitors are required to complete a project record worksheet and MUST be turned in to the Extension Office on Monday within one hour of completion of the weigh-in. The Extension Office will compile all data and it will be presented during judging of the Junior Cattle Feeders Show. This worksheet shall be a part of the information used by the judge in evaluation. The worksheet will be mailed to all members with Junior Cattle Feeder entries prior to the fair. The Extension office will provide uniform corn, silage, and hay prices to be used in completing the worksheet. If an exhibitor fails to complete and turn in the project record worksheet, the premium for this class shall be forfeited.
- 4. Minimum weight on entry day of the fair will be 900 pounds per animal.
- 5. All animals will be entered in the rate of gain contest. Rate of gain will be computed from the date of the December weigh-in to the date of Fair weigh-in. Steers must gain 2.01 pounds per day to be eligible to receive a blue ribbon.
- 6. Junior Cattle Feeder pens will be judged on Monday, July 12. Weighing will begin at 8:00 a.m. that same day and end at 10:00 a.m. The show will begin at 4:00 p.m.
 - 7. If one animal in the pen is injured or has died, the other two or three may be shown provided all calves were weighed in December.
- 8. One animal per pen will be entered in a carcass contest. The other animals are to be returned home on the same day of the show. All Junior Cattle Feeder animals will be loaded out immediately after the show.
- 9. Carcass data show awards will be presented at the locker on the day the carcasses are judged, the Monday after fair.
- 10. Carcass awards will be judged using the 4-H Beef of Merit –High Cutability and High Quality grids

2e. COW-CALF PROJECT

1. Only breeding heifer projects which were tattooed for the cow-calf class during a previous Delaware County Fair may be entered in this class. All records for the cow since she became a project animal (including feed use and costs) must accompany the cow and calf into the show ring for judging. All Cow-Calf exhibits must be entered in 4honline by May 15 and online in FairEntry by July 1. A Cow-Calf Check-in Form is required and due at

fair check-in.

- 2. Cow-Calf projects will be divided into two classes as follows:
- a. Cow-Calf Class Under 2 Years of Age: animals that were first shown as heifers in the 2020 Delaware County Fair.
- b. Mature Cow-Calf Class: animals that were first shown as heifers in the Delaware County Fair in 2019 / or earlier.
- 3. Breeding heifers shown as projects at 2021 Fair, may be shown in future years in a cow-calf class, which includes yearly production records on the cow. To be eligible for this class in future years, heifers must be tattooed at the fair. Contact the beef show superintendent during the Tuesday weighin to have a heifer tattooed.
- 4. Previously entered Cow-Calf projects cannot switch exhibitors. Previously entered Breeding Heifer projects cannot be shown by another exhibitor the following year as a Cow-Calf project.
- 5. If there are fewer than two (2) entries in either of the Cow-Calf classes, the two classes will be combined and shown as one class. In the event that the classes are combined, mature cow-calf entries will be eligible for ribbon placing only and will not compete for Champion.
- 6. If the calf of the cow or heifer of the cow/calf project dies, the cow/calf project is over for that year of calving. No foster calves are allowed.
- 7. Cow-Calf classes will be shown on Monday, July 12 at 7:00 p.m. immediately following the Pen of 3 Show



3a. DAIRY

1. All dairy projects including cattle and goats must be identified online in 4-H Online by midnight May 15. If this is not an option for you, contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15. Entries must



- also be entered online in FairEntry by July 1. A Dairy Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in. The exhibitor is responsible for submitting entries that comply with fair rules. Ineligible entries must be removed from the fairgrounds.
- 2. All dairy projects <u>must</u> be identified by a permanent tattoo or ear tag number that is identical to such identification in 4-H Online, on the 4-H Dairy Project Identification Forms on file for that animal, or be identified by a current sketch or photograph on an Identification Form filed by May 15. Changes in a project's ear tag number should be reported to the Extension office as soon as possible to avoid confusion during the fair. Any animal that is not correctly identified will be sent home.
- 3. Dairy project animals may be owned or leased. If identifying a leased animal, the Dairy Project Lease Document must be completed and turned into the Extension Office by May 15.
- 4. <u>All dairy</u> animals must be checked in with Dairy Department personnel immediately upon arrival and inspected before unloading by an accredited veterinarian. Exhibitors are NOT required to present a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. See Livestock Health Requirements for more details.
- 5. Entries are open to purebred and grade animals of the following breeds: Holstein, Jersey, Guernsey, Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, and Milking Shorthorn, as well as crossbred animals.



- 6. The classes and dates are as follows:
 - Cow Class four years old and older Born before Sept. 1, 2017
 - Cow Class three years old and under four Sept. 1, 2017–Sept. 1, 2018

NO MORE THAN ONE PURCHASED HEIFER (Purchased in current project year) MAY BE ENTERED AND **EXHIBITED IN ANY CLASS.** Any animal is considered to be purchased unless that animal's mother is NOW or AT ONE TIME WAS THE MEMBER'S PROJECT. This applies whether the animal was given to the member or the member paid money for it.

- 10. Exhibitors wishing to show a cow in the Cow Class that has completed 305 day lactation prior to June 1st this year must complete the State Production Contest forms and submit them to the County Extension Office by the last Friday in June of this year, June 25, 2021.
- 11. The Dairy Herd Class shall consist of three female animals of one breed and owned by one exhibitor. One of these animals must be the progeny of the exhibitor's current project animals or former project animals. One milking female must be included. All animals shown in this class shall be entered and shown in their respective individual classes.
- 12. 4-H and FFA members must own the animals individually or as part of a family enterprise.
- 13. Breeds will be alternated by classes. The Dairy Kiddie Show will begin at noon.
- 14. Dairy cows and goats in milk will be released following the conclusion of the Dairy Cattle and Goat Shows. All other dairy cattle will be released after 4:00 p.m. on Friday, July 16. All animals must be moved to the "new" dairy barn and stalls in the "old" dairy barn must be cleaned prior to 5 a.m. on Saturday, July 17.
- 15. Show superintendents have the authority to assign stall space and manage the barn. Exhibitors are expected to cooperate with superintendents in placing animals in the barn to make the best use of available space.
- 16. The Outstanding Dairy Exhibitor trophy will be awarded by the Dairy Department committee to the exhibitor who, in the opinion of committee members, has made the greatest overall contribution to the success of this year's Dairy Show.
- 17. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), Delaware County 4-H club leader or FFA advisor, current Delaware County 4-H or FFA member or pre-approved person upon written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th. - 1. Entries in the dog show are limited to 4-H'ers enrolled in the 4-H dog project and who have identified their dog in 4-H Online on or before May 15. A paper copy of the 4-H Dog Identification Report Form may be requested at the first workshop. Contact the Delaware County Extension Office if you need assistance with this process.
- 2. Immediate family members (siblings and step-siblings) can co-identify the same dog for the dog project. Each dog must still be identified in 4-H Online under each sibling/4-H member. Siblings must both be enrolled in 4-H to identify the same dog. The same animal will only be allowed to show in a class **ONCE**.
- 3. Online entry in FairEntry must be completed by July 1. A Dog Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in.
- 4. Each exhibitor must check in with the superintendent with their dog between 9:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. on Monday, July 12. Judging will begin promptly at 9:30 a.m. in the show ring
- 5. No drugs, artificial stimulants, or relaxants are allowed.
- 6. All dogs exhibited must have a current rabies vaccination certificate.
- 7. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), Delaware County 4-H club leader or FFA advisor, current Delaware County 4-H or FFA member or pre-approved person upon written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th. Exhibitors who violate the grooming rule will not be eligible to place higher than third in their class. Violations discovered after the class was judged, including after the show, will be stripped of any class placing above third place including

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loss of trophies and loss of premium. A second violation during the same year or subsequent years by the exhibitor will be reviewed by the department superintendent, extension staff member and representative of the Extension Youth Committee and punishment could include suspension from exhibiting in subsequent Delaware County Fairs.



- 1. Each horse brought to the fair must be identified in 4-H Online by midnight May 15. If this is not an option for you, contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15. No more than three (3) horses may be identified as projects by each exhibitor. The identity of the owner of each horse, regardless of class, must be listed in 4honline. To be eligible for halter classes, a horse must be owned by the exhibitor or the exhibitor's immediate family
 - a. If the horse is not owned by the exhibitor or the exhibitor's immediate family, the Horse Department committee will determine if the horse is eligible to be shown as a "leased horse" in showmanship or performance classes under Livestock Division General Exhibit Rule 4(d). In addition, the exhibitor will be required to keep a written record of his or her activities involving the care of the horse. These records must be submitted at a project meeting prior to the Horse Show. A horse shown as a "leased horse" may not be shown by more than one exhibitor during the show.
 - b. Immediate family members (siblings and step-siblings) can co-identify the same horse for the horse project. Each horse must still be identified in 4honline under each sibling/4-H member. Siblings must both be enrolled in 4-H to identify the same horse. The same animal will only be allowed to show in a class ONCE.
- 2. Online entry in FairEntry must be completed by July 1.
- 3. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. - 4. All registered horses/ponies must include copies of their registration papers showing ownership with their livestock identification forms. If registration is not complete at the time of identification, then a copy of the bill of sale and transfer application must be included with the identification forms. Final registration papers must be submitted as soon as received by the exhibitor.
- 5. A horse or pony may be entered in either the halter class, under saddle, or both.
- 6. Entries are open to horses and ponies enrolled as projects that meet the class qualifications. No stallions (yearling or older) may be entered. Ages of horses or ponies shall be based upon January 1. Entries will be limited to two (2) animals per exhibitor.
- 7. No drugs, artificial stimulants, or relaxants are allowed.
- 8. Miniature horses and entries over 56 inches will be shown in the horse classes. Pony class entries may not exceed the following height limits based on the pony's age: Yearlings: 51½ in., 2-yr-olds: 54 in., 3-yr-olds: 55 in., 4-yr-olds: 55½ in., 5-yr-olds: 56 in.
- 9. The champions and reserve champions in the halter class shall be the only ones eligible to be selected as Grand Champion. All animals must have received a blue ribbon to be eligible for this class.
- 10. Prohibited equipment in Pleasure, Horsemanship and Walk/Trot classes include mechanical hackamores, hackamore bits, running or standing martingales, tie downs, choke ropes, draw reins or cavesson type nose bands.
- 11. Exhibitors are required to wear a white long sleeve shirt or blouse, solid blue or black riding style jeans, and hard soled boots with heels. Ties are optional. Long hair should be contained. Western hat is optional only for halter and showmanship classes, and if worn, should be affixed in a manner to keep it from coming off. Exhibitors whose hats come off during an event shall be placed at the bottom of the class. Chaps will not be allowed. Spurs are optional and must comply with the Iowa State 4-H rules which states western spurs must be dull and the rowels free moving, or English or hunt seat spurs of the unroweled type and no longer than one inch. The judge will not give extra credit for special, costly attire or equipment.
- 12. All 4-H and FFA county fair horse exhibitors and participants in 4-H horse project activities MUST wear ASTM/STI approved protective headgear for horses with chin strap and properly fitted harness when mounted and riding or driving—Every time, every ride.

- 13. The superintendent may prevent an exhibitor from entering the show ring if, in the superintendent's judgment, the exhibitor's clothing or equipment presents a potential safety hazard. The judge shall have the authority to require the removal or alteration of any piece of equipment that, in his or her opinion, is unsafe, would tend to give a horse an unfair advantage, or that he or she believes to be inhumane. Show Superintendents reserve the right to refuse an exhibitor entry into any call or event if the deem that entry unsafe for the exhibitor or other exhibitors or animals. All show Superintendents have the authority and may dismiss from the ring any entry that is unruly or not in sufficient control for safety of the handler or other exhibitors.
- 14. Only stock type breeds are eligible to be shown in "Western" halter classes. All other horse breeds will be considered a "Classical" breed.
- 15. A **mandatory** meeting for all first and second year county fair exhibitors will be scheduled to discuss safety and county fair rules. First and second year exhibitors **must** attend this meeting to be eligible to participate in the Horse Show.
- 16. All exhibitors <u>must attend at least two</u> project meetings to be eligible to show at the county fair. One meeting must be in the classroom and one meeting must be at a demonstration/riding clinic.
- 17. The Superintendent may refer to "A Guide for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa" in situations where these rules are silent or ambiguous.
- 18. All animals must be checked in with Horse and Pony Department personnel upon arrival and inspected by an accredited veterinarian, regardless of whether the exhibitor has obtained a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. See general livestock health rules for details.
- 19. HIGH POINT EXHIBITOR: Champion and Reserve High Point Exhibitor awards will be given for each level. Points will be awarded based on participation in halter classes (any age of horse), showmanship, performance classes and timed events. In timed events, only 1 entry will be awarded high points. Tandem Bareback class is not included in high point. Points will also be awarded for participation at any of the following:
 - A. 1 point per Horse Project meeting and open ride attended
 - B. 2 points for attending the Eastern Iowa Horse and Pony Camp
 - C. Delaware County Fair

Points awarded for participation in county fair classes are as follows:

6 points – 1st place

5 points – 2nd place

4 points – 3rd place

- 20. Each horse exhibitor will be assigned a stall for each entry as space allows. Horses/ponies under the age of 2 and lactating mares will be released following the show and will not stay in the barn. If there are more entries than stalls available, the horse committee will decide which entries will stay in the barn and which entries will be released following the show. The availability of tack stalls will be decided by the show committee. Entries will be released between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 15, 2021. Exhibitors seeking exemption from this release time must submit a written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th for consideration.
- 21. TThe Delaware County Fair Board will use diligence to insure the safety of animals and articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will they be responsible for any loss, injury or damage. It is recommended that expensive tack not be left at the fairgrounds following the show. Horse/pony stalls are not allowed to be padlocked and horses/ponies must have halters on while stalled in the event of an emergency. Lead ropes should be clipped to the outside of the stall of each horse or pony.
- 22. Exhibitors will be required to keep feed, bedding, equipment, etc., in



- the space set aside for this purpose. Straw bedding is not allowed in the barns. The public alleyways must at all times be kept open and free from litter, feed, equipment, etc. There will be <u>no</u> cross-tying allowed in the alleyways. Show preparation of the exhibitors' horse/pony must be done inside the stall.
- 23. The show committee has the authority to dismiss from the barn any horse/pony if, in their judgment, the animal poses a safety risk to other animals or exhibitors during their stay on the fairgrounds.
- 24. Stalls must be appropriately cleaned daily and when animals are released from the fairgrounds. Horses/ponies must be appropriately cared for daily. Stall cards cannot be removed. These will be removed by the show committee. If stall cleanliness or animal care is deemed unsatisfactory, individual premiums will be withheld and/or awards may be forfeited.
- 25. Horses/ponies staying in the barn must remain in the immediate area near the horse barn and horse arena and are not allowed in any other areas of the fairgrounds. Following the horse show, horses/ponies can only be mounted and ridden in the arena. The rules of protective head gear must be followed at all times. The Fair Board will post times that the arena will be closed.

These classes will be judged for placings, but will not be eligible for selection as Grand Champion or Reserve Champion of the show. Detailed instructions in each class may be obtained from Horse Department Superintendents or the Extension Office. Registered and grade horses will show in the same class. The following classes will be judged under saddle

- and all ages and breeds are eligible.
- 2. The superintendent may combine or split classes as necessary for the management of the show.
- 3. Walk/Trot classes promote safe riding habits to exhibitors. The rider will walk and trot the horses in a natural gait and reserve the horses on the rail. Riders will line up and back their horses at least three steps for the judge.
- 4. In-Hand Trail is a trail class where the exhibitor leads their horse through trail obstacles. This class is open to any age horse or pony and any age exhibitor. However, the same horse or pony can only be shown in one trail class, either 5700, 5705, 5710, 5715, 5720, 5725.
- 5. Gaming classes will be run in a closed arena.
- 6. Performance classes will be divided among three levels. Each level has a set of criteria that determines an exhibitor's skill or knowledge of the Horse Project area. Each exhibitor will attend clinics, open rides, and work with Horse Superintendents to determine which level the exhibitor will compete in at the Fair. More information and guidelines on each level will be provided by Horse Superintends to exhibitors prior to fair.



- 1. All market sheep exhibits must be weighed in at the May weigh-in and entered into 4-H Online by the exhibitor prior to May 15, and entered in FairEntry by July 1. All other sheep exhibits must be entered in 4-H Online by midnight, May 15 and entered in FairEntry by July 1. If this is not an option for you, contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15.
- 2. Check-in and weigh-in at the fair will be Monday, July 12, from 8:00 a.m.-10:00 a.m. All sheep exhibits must be checked in with Sheep Department personnel immediately upon arrival on Monday, July 12, and inspected before unloading or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. A Market/Breeding Sheep Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in. Market Sheep exhibitors are also required to complete a drug affidavit stating their projects comply with all state and federal regulations involving proper drug usage and all Food & Drug Administration, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Food Safety Inspection Service, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations.
- 3. Entries in all classes must be docked.
- 4. All entries must have been sheared over entire body with a regular comb. It is recommended that lambs not be blocked. Exception: entries in the

- "Other Sheep (Special Wool) Class" will show by their association rules for wool.
- 5. Animals shown in the breeding classes may not be shown in the market classes and vice-versa - except a market ewe lamb may be shown in the Young Breeders Flock.
- 6. Exhibitors may be assisted only by eligible Delaware County 4-H and FFA members for showing pens of three, flocks, and individuals.
- 7. All entries must be in the possession and under direct management of the members on or before May 1, 2021.
- 8. All lambs and breeding stock must be ear tagged.
- 9. All other sheep will be released after 4:30 p.m. on Friday, July 16. However, exhibits to be sold in the auction may remain in the Sheep and Goat Barn until the end of the Livestock sale on Saturday. All other exhibits must be removed, cleaned and pens tore down by 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 17, otherwise premiums will be forfeited. Exhibitors are responsible for the care of the lamb prior to the sale.
- 10. Classes with more than 10 head in a class may be split.
- 11. All reproductively intact sheep (ewes, does, rams, bucks) must have a scrapie flock ear tag before they can be shown at the Delaware County Fair.
- 12. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed

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at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), Delaware County 4-H club leader or FFA advisor, current Delaware County 4-H or FFA member or pre-approved person upon written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th. 

- 16. Classroom and/or demonstration project meetings may be held for all exhibitors. It is strongly recommended that first and second year exhibitors attend.
- 17. Home Raised Market Sheep will be recognized. Barrows and Gilts in the Market Swine Show & Breeding Gilt Show must weigh between 240-300 pounds with plus or minus 2% in order to be in the Championship Drive. You may still show, but will only be allowed a ribbon and not eligible for the Championship Drive or the Matrix. The Swine Classes at the Delaware County Fair will be cut by the ending weight for the Market (Barrow & Gilt) and Breeding Gilt show, beginning weight will be used for the Derby show.
- 2. All swine must be entered online in FairEntry by July 1. A Swine Checkin Form is required and due at fair check-in. Swine exhibitors are also required to complete a drug affidavit stating their projects comply with all state and federal regulations involving proper drug usage and all Food & Drug Administration, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Food Safety Inspection Service, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations.
- 3. Each exhibitor may exhibit any combination of barrows and/or gilts, up to the total number of 4 swine entries. Swine will be shown in separate Market Barrow, Market Gilt, Derby Gilt, Derby Barrow, and Breeding Gilt divisions. Each exhibitor may show a maximum of one breeding gilt. Each exhibitor who wishes to show a breeding gilt must designate that pig at the Tuesday Fair weigh-in on the Swine Check-in form. Late breeding gilt designations will not be allowed.
- 4. The Delaware County 4-H / FFA Swine Show is a terminal show, with the exception of designated breeding gilts.
- 5. It is highly recommended to secure a locker spot for pigs to be harvested after Fair, but a locker spot is not required to exhibit swine at the Delaware County Swine Show. There will be a terminal outlet available for exhibitors.
- 6. Exhibitors showing a breeding gilt will have the option to take their breeding gilt home, but must adhere to following rules:
 - a. Breeding gilts returning home after the Delaware County Fair must obtain a premise ID number prior to Fair check-in. Premise ID numbers can be obtained here: https://iowaagriculture.gov/animal-industry-bureau/animal-disease-traceability
 - b. Exhibitors must designate their breeding gilt as returning home on their Swine Check-In form. This paperwork must be completed before pigs unload at Fair Check-in. The decision cannot be changed

- once the paperwork is turned in. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- c. Each exhibitor may show a maximum of one breeding gilt.
- d. Designated Breeding Gilts returning home will be released from 6:00-7:30 p.m. on Friday. Load out will be on the East end of the Swine Barn.
- e. The designated breeding gilt cannot be sold at the auction.
- f. Exhibitors who fail to follow these rules could result in a 1 year suspension from the Delaware County Swine Show. The violation and consequence will be determined by a review committee, including a member of the Extension staff or the Youth Committee, the department superintendent, and one other review committee member (see General Rules #15a and #15b).
- 7. Exhibitors must notify the Extension Office if a tag is lost and have it replaced prior to the fair.
- 8. All 4-H and FFA swine entered must have been farrowed on or after January 1, 2021.
- 9. Entries are open to purebred, crossbred, or grade pigs.
- 10. Recognition of Family Owned Farrowed animals will take place after the Grand Champion Market Barrow drive and before the carcass contest.
- 11. All swine must be clean at the time of the Tuesday weigh-in, and the ear tags should be clearly visible. If in the opinion of the weigh-in officials an animal is not sufficiently clean, the animal must be cleaned and returned to the end of the line before it will be weighed in.
- 12. All swine will be evaluated by the weigh-in committee when unloaded to be weighed and scanned on Tuesday. Any animals that have a serious injury, are structurally unsound, or exhibit cryptorchidism will be disqualified from the show and the auction and will not be eligible for premiums.
- 13. Breeding gilts who have met the criteria, filled out the appropriate paperwork, and elected to go home will be allowed the option to keep their state fair tags in. All other state fair tags must be removed from all terminal swine.
- 14. All swine will be entered in the percent lean classes. There will be separate divisions for gilts and barrows.
- 15. Market swine will be assigned to a weight division based on the animal's Tuesday entry weight. Derby swine will be assigned to a weight division based on the animal's March weight.
- 16. All swine brought to the fairgrounds, with the exception of designated breeding gilts (see rule #6), must be sent to slaughter -- absolutely no exceptions. Slaughter or locker facilities that have been designated to receive a swine from the fair, or anyone acting on behalf of such a slaughter or locker facility, must not knowingly allow that swine to be diverted

to any other location prior to arriving at the facility, or allow that hog to be transported to another location after arriving at the slaughter facility or locker. If the slaughter or locker facility knows or suspects that the swine has been transported to any other location at any point prior to slaughter, the slaughter or locker facility is expected to immediately notify the Swine Department committee, the County Extension office, or the Fair Board. Upon notification of a suspected violation, slaughter or locker facilities are expected to cooperate with the committee, Extension office, Fair Board, and/or Department of Agriculture officials in any investigation of possible violations of fair rules or state regulations. Any slaughter or locker facility that willfully violates or ignores this rule will be ineligible to receive any animals of any species from the Delaware County Fair for a period of two years from the date of the suspected violation of terminal show rules.

- 17. Due to packer demands and concerns, it is strongly recommended that swine are not clipped. Hair should not be shorter than ½ inch. Reminder: NO clipping on the fairgrounds.
- 18. There shall be no coloring agents, powder, oil, gels, conditioners, or any other foreign substance used on the swine. The use of any is strictly prohibited. Swine in violation will not be allowed to show.
- 19. No injectable medications can be given one week prior to or at the fair. All other medications must meet withdrawal times on the label of the medication.
- 20. All swine must stay in the exhibitor's assigned pens until load out by show superintendents.
- 21. All swine and swine pens must be kept clean and presentable with fresh bedding at all times. If pens are not kept acceptable, premium money will be withheld.
- 22. Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell one hog of his or her choice in the swine sale. Sale order will be determined by drawing at the Extension office. Eligible champion hogs will be sold first, followed by the order of the drawing.
- 23. When designating a swine for sale in the auction, swine sale participants must choose a swine with an ending weight between 240 and 300 pounds, if possible. However, if none of an exhibitor's entries meet this standard, that exhibitor must sell the swine that is closest to that weight range.
- 24. Exhibitors or buyers who sell swine to the packer will receive the packer's net price minus any discounts for light and heavy hogs. Swine sent to slaughter at a local locker plant are to be hauled by the locker plant personnel or other hauler designated by the Fair Board or Superintendent, not the exhibitor, buyer, exhibitor's or buyer's family, or any agent or employee of the exhibitor or buyer. ALL SWINE WILL GO BACK TO

THEIR PENS AFTER BEING SOLD IN THE SALE.

- 25. No pens are to be cleaned until after the entire sale is over and no pen signs are to be removed by exhibitors. Failure to comply will result in loss of premium money.
- 26. Tuesday entry weights will be used for the auction. There will be no re-weighing for the auction.
- 27. All entries must be in the possession and under direct management of the exhibitor from the March weigh-in until the end of the Delaware County Fair.
- 28. Cost of ultrasound will be paid by the exhibitor. Unpaid ultrasound fees and other charges will be deducted from premium checks.
- 29. All chlortetracycline (CTC) products must be withdrawn from all swine exhibits <u>at least two weeks earlier</u> than required by the label.
- 30. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), Delaware County 4-H club leader or FFA advisor, current Delaware County 4-H or FFA member or pre-approved person upon written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th. Exhibitors who violate




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the grooming rule will not be eligible to place higher than third in their class. Violations discovered after the class was judged, including after the show, will be stripped of any class placing above third place including loss of trophies and loss of premium. A second violation during the same year or subsequent years by the exhibitor will be reviewed by the department superintendent, extension staff member and representative of the Extension Youth Committee and punishment could include suspension from exhibiting in subsequent Delaware County Fairs.

- 31. No drugs, artificial stimulants, or relaxants are allowed.
- 32. Swine exhibitors at the Delaware County Fair must sign and present an owner drug affidavit that the animals being exhibited did not originate from a quarantined herd and to the best of their knowledge; swine dysentery has not been in evidence in their herd for the past 12 months.



- 1. All meat goat exhibits must be weighed in and tagged at the May weigh-in. All market goat exhibits must also be entered into 4-H Online by the exhibitor prior to May 15, and entered in FairEntry by July 1. All other goat exhibits must be entered in 4-H Online by midnight, May 15 and entered in FairEntry by July 1. If this is not an option for you, please contact the Delaware County Extension Office before May 15. A Market Meat Goat/ Breeding Goat Check-in Form is required and due at fair check-in. Meat Goat exhibitors are also required to complete a drug affidavit stating their projects comply with all state and federal regulations involving proper drug usage and all Food & Drug Administration, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Food Safety Inspection Service, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations.
- 2. Dairy Goats will be exhibited in the Dairy Show on Wednesday, July 14 (See Dairy Department for additional rules and information). Meat Goats and Fiber Goats will be exhibited in the Meat Goat Show on Tuesday, July 13. Pygmy and novelty goats may be exhibited either in the Pet Show on Tuesday, July 13, or in the Meat Goat Show, but must be identified in both shows in 4-H Online by May 15th.
- 3. At the May weigh-in and July 12th Fair check-in day, all goats' paperwork and exhibitor information, must be properly filled out and documented **PRIOR** to unloading.
- 4. Goats to be shown in the Meat Goat show will be checked in between 8:00 and 10:00 a.m. on Monday, July 12, at the Sheep & Goat Barn. Meat goat exhibits will be weighed in at that time. All meat goat exhibits must be checked in with Goat Department personnel immediately upon arrival and inspected before unloading or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. All goats may be subject to be mouthed by the judge during their time at the fair.
- 5. All reproductively intact goats must have a scrapie flock ID before they can be shown at the Delaware County Fair.
- 6. Goats must be collared or haltered in the ring.
- 7. Classes may be split or combined as necessary for show management.

- 8. All goats will be released after 4:30 p.m. on Friday. However, exhibits to be sold in the auction may remain in the Sheep and Goat Barn until the end of the Livestock sale on Saturday. All other exhibits must be removed, cleaned and pens tore down by 10:00 a.m. on Saturday. Exhibitors are responsible for the care of the goat prior to the sale.
- 9. A maximum of one meat goat per exhibitor may be sold at the Livestock Auction on Saturday of the fair.
- 10. All Meat Goats sold at the auction must be removed immediately following the Livestock Auction. Exhibitors are responsible for arrangements with the buyer of their meat goat to ensure the meat goat gets to the sale barn, locker, etc.... immediately following the sale.
- 11. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by an immediate family member (parent/legal guardian, grandma, grandpa, brother, or sister), Delaware County 4-H club leader or FFA advisor, current Delaware County 4-H or FFA member or pre-approved person upon written request to the Youth Committee by June 15th. Exhibitors who violate the grooming rule will not be eligible to place higher than third in their class. Violations discovered after the class was judged, including after the show, will be stripped of any class placing above third place including



loss of trophies and loss of premium. 2. Each exhibitor will be eligible to show no more than four individual breeding goats, with no more than two in one class.

12b. MARKET MEAT GOATS

- 1. Only wethers and does may be shown in market meat goat classes. All male meat goats must be castrated by the May weigh-in. Only wethers may be shown in the Dairy Market Class. Dairy market wether is defined as a combination of two dairy breeds or purebred dairy breed.
- 2. Market Meat goats must have all deciduous incisors (front pair of milk teeth) in place and show no evidence of breaking the skin or eruption of permanent incisors at time of fair weigh-in. Show officials will disqualify a goat if, in their judgment, the teeth have been tampered with.
- 3. If horned, meat goats must have horn tips blunted. Tipping or horn removal must be done before goats are brought to the fairgrounds.
- 4. All market meat goats will be eligible for rate of gain.
- 5. Each exhibitor will be eligible to show no more than four individual meat goats.
- 6. All market wethers and market does must be uniformly clipped with 3/8 inch length of hair or less above the knee and hock joints to include the head, excluding the tail, prior to arrival at the fairgrounds on Monday.
- 7. Champion and Reserve Champion Home Raised Market Meat Goats will be recognized. To be eligible for the Home Raised Market Meat Goat designation, in addition to meeting all other market animal requirements, the animal must have been born and raised on the 4-H and FFA member's

farm or livestock home location. Exhibitors must identify any home raised market animal at the May weigh-in.

COMMUNICATIONS GENERAL RULES

- 1. Entries for Educational Presentations, Working Exhibits, Share the Fun, and Extemporaneous Speaking classes must be entered online in FairEntry by 4:30 p.m. May 28. Please contact the Extension Office before May 28 if you need assistance with this process.
- 2. Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of his/her 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- 3. The county Communication program shall consist of three age divisions: Junior (grades 4, 5, and 6); Intermediate (grades 7 & 8); and Senior (grades 9 through 12). Grade level is determined on September 15, 2020.
- 4. All age groups can enter the Educational Presentations, Working Exhibits and Share the Fun classes. Teams may consist of members in different grades and may be members of different clubs. However, the team must be entered in the grade division of the older member. Example: a team

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- with an intermediate and a senior member must be entered in the Senior Division.
- 5. The 4-H / FFA uniform should be worn by members unless other dress is more appropriate.
- 6. Exhibitors must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
- 7. Presenters are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted materials may not be distributed without permission.
- 8. The county Educational Presentation, Share the Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking contest will be held at West Delaware High School in Manchester on Thursday, July 1, scheduled to begin at 6:00 p.m. Working Exhibits will be judged on Thursday, July 15, from 12:00 4:00 p.m. Schedules will be mailed to participants.
- 9. Results from the Communications Event will be announced at the Delaware County Fair in the Exhibit Hall on Thursday, July 15 at the completion of Working Exhibits judging. All Communications participants are highly encouraged to attend to receive their judging comments, placings, and awards.
- 10. All the participants who compete at the county level in Share the Fun, Educational Presentations, Extemporaneous Speaking, or Working Exhibits will be entitled to ride the bus to the Iowa State Fair.
- 11. The judges will make the final selection of the presentations and working exhibits to represent the county at the State Fair. 4-H members whose communications entries (educational presentation, working exhibit, or Share the Fun) are selected to attend State Fair are expected to participate. If they cannot, they are to notify the Extension Office by August 1st to enable an alternate to attend in their place. Failure to notify the Extension Office will result in the loss of premium money.
- 12. The following rules apply to State Fair participation:
 - a. The minimum age for participants is fifth grade as of Sept 15, 2020.
 - b. 4-H'ers from any age division may represent the county at State Fair.
 - c. A county may enter up to a total of six Educational Presentations, four Working Exhibits, two Extemporaneous Speakers, and three Share the Fun acts.

EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATIONS

Educational Presentations provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to demonstrate their communications skills by presenting knowledge, information or a process to gain a desired response from an audience.



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- 1. Educational Presentations may be given by one or more members. The topic of the presentation should determine its length, but intermediate and senior presentations should be no more than 20 minutes. Junior presentations should not exceed 15 minutes.
- 2. Each club is encouraged to enter a minimum of one presentation. A club will receive 1 point per presentation given by their club members. The club with the most points will receive \$25.

EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING CONTEST

The Extemporaneous Speaking contest is designed to encourage the development of the life skill of communicating with others through enhancing the ability to think, to organize, to speak and to answer questions readily by participating 4-H'ers before an audience. Each contestant will select one of the available topics and have thirty minutes to prepare before the contest. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. All reference material will be screened by a contest official. Contestants may bring his/her own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference (cannot be notes, outlines, speeches prepared by the contestant or by another person). Some historical material related to the 4-H program will be available in the preparation room. Contestants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. Each speech shall be between four and six minutes, with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions which shall be asked by the judge.

- 1. Participants must be senior 4-H members, at least in 9th grade by Sept 15, 2020
- 2. Each club is encouraged to enter a minimum of one speaker. A club will receive 1 point per presentation given by their club members. The club with the most points will receive \$10.
- 3. The judges will make the final selection of the speakers to advance to the State Fair. Each county is allowed to advance two entries.

133A Extemporaneous Speaking Contest (Seniors only)

SHARE THE FUN

Share the Fun provides an opportunity for 4-H'ers to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

Participants must be Delaware County 4-H members who have completed 4th grade through 12th grade in 2021. There is no limit to the number of Share the Fun acts per club. A club will receive 1 point per ACT entered in Share the Fun. The club with the most points will receive \$10.

- 1. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six minutes in length.
- 2. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment will be acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- 3. Members are limited to participation in one individual and/ or one group Share the Fun act.
- 4. Participants must furnish their own props and equipment with the exception of a piano and PA system.
- 5. The minimum age for State Fair participants is fifth grade as of September 15, 2020. Exception: If a total club is selected to participate, at least 80% of the club members must have completed grade five.

Working exhibits provide an opportunity for youth to communicate, interact with and teach an audience in an informal way. Members are encouraged to have many stages of the exhibit or product on hand so that any step can be discussed with the public. No set formats should be used. Questions that might be asked as starters are:

- 1. Have you seen....?
- 2. May I show you how.....?
- 3. Would you like to know how to....?

The best subject involves the audience in some doing, feeling, tasting, smelling, or judging activity.

- 1. Members will give their working exhibit on Thursday, July 15, between 12:00 and 4:00 p.m. Working Exhibits will be scheduled for a 30-minute period for all participants/teams. Several working exhibits will be scheduled during the same time period.
- 2. There is no limit on the number of working exhibits per club. A club will receive 1 point per presentation given by their club members. The club with the most points will receive \$10.

SPECIAL COMMUNICATION AWARDS

Members must notify Extension Staff at least one day before the contest if they want considered for these awards.

- 1. **Dairy Award** -- The Delaware County Dairy Council may award a \$5 cash prize to any 4-H'er giving an educational presentation or working exhibit stressing dairy products or the dairy industry. An additional \$5 may be awarded for a purple ribbon. Representatives of the Dairy Council will make final decisions.
- 2. **Pork Award** -- The Delaware County Pork Producer Board may award a \$5 cash prize for all presentations or working exhibits promoting pork. Final award is at the discretion of the Board. A special award may be presented if that 4-H'ers presentation is selected to go on to State Fair.
- 3. **Beef Award** -- The Delaware County Cattlemen may award a \$5 cash prize for all presentations or working exhibits specifically on beef or beef by-products. 4-H'ers receiving blue ribbons or above may receive an additional \$5.
- 4. **State Fair Bus Trip** -- All the participants who compete at the county level in Share the Fun, Educational Presentations, Extemporaneous Speaking, or Working Exhibits will be entitled to ride the bus to the Iowa State Fair.

FASHION REVUE

- 1. All participants should:
 - a. Have been enrolled in a 4-H Clothing project in the current 4-H program year.
 - b. Model a garment or outfit the entrant has constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year. A garment or outfit consisting of one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats are acceptable as Fashion Revue entries. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.
- Fashion Revue entries must entered online in FairEntry form by May 28, 2021.
- 3. Judging will be done according to age groups: Junior (grades 4, 5 and 6); Intermediate (grades 7 & 8); and Senior (grades 9 12). Grades are as of September 15, 2020.
- 4. All participants must complete a "4-H Fashion Revue Report Form" and a 3"x5" card for the style show commentary with a brief description of the garment and where it will be worn and bring them to judging. There must be a color picture of themselves in their garment attached to the report form prior to judging.
- 5. Evaluation of all entries will be done on Monday, June 28, starting at 5:30 p.m. in the Community Center on the Delaware County Fairgrounds. Judging schedules will be sent to participants prior to judging.
- 6. The Style Show will be held the same night as the judging. Participants will be required to model their outfits after the judging has been completed. If the 4-H'er cannot be present for the style show, an Extension staff member should be informed or there will be loss of premium money.
- 7. A garment entered in the Fashion Revue may also be entered in regular clothing project competition. Outfits or accessories that will be worn in the State Fair Fashion Revue cannot be selected as a state fair clothing exhibit.
- 8. To be eligible for State Fair contest, a 4-H member must be a senior 4-H member and has been enrolled for at least 1 year in the clothing project, including 2021. The 4-H member may have previously represented the county at the State 4-H Fashion Revue.
- 9. A 4-H member may enter the 4-H Fashion Revue, 4-H Clothing Selection,

or \$15 Challenge programs, but may only represent Delaware County in one of the events at State Fair in any one year.

CLOTHING SELECTION

- 1. All participants should:
 - a. Select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H'er's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
 - b. Have had individual planned or county experience(s) in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.
- 2. Clothing Selection outfits may be selected and/or purchased from any source, including consignment shops, used clothing stores, etc. Clothing items which are home-sewn are not eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible.
- 3. This is a co-educational event open to any 4-H member. Clothing Selection entries must be entered online in FairEntry by May 28.
- 4. Participants will model an outfit they SELECTED and/or PURCHASED that represents the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the selected outfit. All purchases must be within one year from the date of entry. No "gift" item may be used as a major item in the outfit.
- 5. Evaluation of all entries will be on Monday, June 28th, at 5:30 p.m. in the Community Center on the fairgrounds. Clothing Event participants must complete the online scheduling form to sign up for a time for their clothing project to be judged. A finalized schedule will be sent to participants prior to judging.
- 6. To be eligible for the State Fair contest, a 4-H member must be a Senior 4-H member. One girl and one boy may represent Delaware County and a 4-H member may participate once in State Fair Clothing Selection.
- 7. All participants must complete a "4-H Clothing Selection Program Report Form" and a 3"x5" card (for the style show commentary) with a brief description of their outfit and where it will be worn and bring them to the judging. There must be a color picture of themselves in their garment attached to the report form prior to judging.
- 8. The Style Show will be held the same night as the judging. Participants will be required to model their outfits after the judging has been completed. If the 4-H member cannot be present for the style show, an Extension staff member should be informed or there will be loss of premium money.

- 9. A garment entered in the Clothing Selection Program may also be entered in regular clothing project competition at the fair. Outfits or accessories that will be worn in the State Fair Clothing Selection program cannot be selected as a state fair clothing exhibit.
- 10. A 4-H member may enter the 4-H Clothing Selection, \$15 Challenge and Fashion Revue programs, but may only represent Delaware County in one of the events at State Fair in a year.

4-H CONFERENCE PROJECTS GENERAL RULES

Exhibits for the 4-H Exhibit Building must be entered online in FairEntry by July 1. All conference projects that could be exhibited at the fair should



be entered into FairEntry. If you need assistance with this please contact the Delaware County Extension Office before July 1. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Delaware County Fair 4-H General Rules, 4-H Conference Projects General Rules, and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.

- 1. Fair exhibit classes are broad categories. To plan exhibits, 4-H'ers are encouraged to use project materials to determine goals and learning experiences. An exhibit can represent an idea, a part or all of the learning involved in the respective project or program. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of 4-H'er's participation in the selected project or program during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group of members. Exhibits might be, but are not limited to, an actual product, poster, display box, report, notebook, model, videotape, audiocassette, etc
- 2. An exhibit may only be entered in one project area with one goal.
- 3. School projects are eligible if a 4-H'er has set a goal(s) that can be accomplished by both a classroom assignment and an outgrowth of a 4-H project goal. The intent is that a pre-determined goal has been set. The 4-H'er must realize that the evaluation criteria and exhibit guidelines for each opportunity will be different and should prepare accordingly.
- 4. The 4-H'ers goal & applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the









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evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibit goals are a very important part of judging projects. Participation of the member during judging is imperative, as only they can truly express their goals and appropriately respond to questions from the judge.

- A written explanation, audio recording, or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
- What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
- What steps did you take to learn or do this?
- What were the most important things you learned?
- Judges have limited time to evaluate the total exhibit so the information needs to be well organized. The judge's decision is final. 4-H members, parents, and leaders need to respect their opinion and evaluation.
- 5. All project entries will be judged by schedule on Monday, July 12. Schedules for each club's judging time will be distributed to 4-H families and club leaders prior to fair. Exhibitors who cannot attend judging at their club's assigned time may attend judging at a different time established by appointment.
 - a. If a "special condition" arises which would prevent an exhibitor from participating at any time in the judging, that exhibitor must submit a written request to the Delaware County Youth Committee by June 15th. Upon acceptance of the written request, the exhibits must be taken for judging by another Delaware County 4-H or FFA member.
- 6. Up to **three** exhibits may be entered in a class if the exhibits represent different goals and learning.
- 7. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including the name of the exhibitor, the name of their club, and class number. A completed entry tag should be securely fastened to the main item in each exhibit in an easily seen location. Be sure to include the exhibitor's age and years of participation in the project/program.
- 8. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24"x36" in size.
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48"x48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - Display boxes may not exceed 28"x22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
- 9. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted

- materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.)
- 10. All exhibits, activities and programs must represent appropriate safety procedures in the development of the exhibit through the evaluation process.
- 11. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Game animals legally taken are acceptable. Live specimens of noxious weeds or invasive species are NOT permitted in any exhibit. Dried specimens are acceptable to use in exhibits.
- 12. Judging of exhibits and the payment of premiums will be done on a blue, red and white basis. Purple and lavender recognition will be awarded to outstanding exhibits. No additional premium is paid for purple or lavender exhibits.
- 13. Due to security, members are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit. While the Delaware County Fair Board and Iowa State Extension will use diligence to insure the safety of articles on display, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.
- 14. The 4-H Exhibit Building will be open from noon to 9:00 p.m. on Tuesday through Saturday and noon to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday of fair week. 4-H clubs will be asked to provide responsible members and adults for hosting in the 4-H Building. Any 4-H club that does not show up for their 4-H building hosting assignment will forfeit all their premium money. Clubs are expected to be on time for their assignments.
- 15. All exhibits must be removed from the building on Sunday of fair, between 5:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. Premium money will be forfeited if exhibits or parts of exhibits are removed before this time or left after this time.
- 16. State Fair exhibits will be selected by judges at the county fair. 4-H exhibiting eligibility at the Iowa State Fair will include: 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent). 4-H'ers with exhibits considered for State Fair must notify the Extension Office do not want their exhibit to represent the county at the Iowa State Fair. Failure to send a selected exhibit to State Fair will result in loss of all premiums and the member will be ineligible the following year to have an exhibit sent to the State Fair.
- 17. Any article, selected for State Fair, which is too large to fit with the rest of the exhibits into a van is the responsibility of the exhibitor to transport to and from State Fair. Items are entered on the first Tuesday of the State Fair and are released after 7 p.m. on the final Sunday or before noon Monday of the State Fair.

18. **PHOTOS FOR NEWSPAPER** -- Exhibit winners for State Fair, State Fair Alternates, Considered for State Fair, and Outstanding Juniors are asked to be present for photos on **Tuesday**, **July 13 at 2:00 p.m.** in the Grandstands area. This will be the only time that photos will be taken! If you are exhibiting in a livestock show during this time, please do NOT leave the show.

SPECIAL AWARDS

Pigskin/Pork Production Award -- The Delaware County Pork Producer Board may select one quality pigskin or pork production exhibit from each age division. The winners may receive a free ticket to the annual Pork Banquet in the fall where an award will be presented. Members must notify Extension Staff on or before judging day of exhibits they want considered for this award.

All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Delaware County 4-H Conference Project Rules. Up to three exhibits may be entered in a class if the exhibits represent different goals and learning. Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements that will be included in the judging process. Members are highly encouraged go to http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/ to find information about judging criteria for exhibits that they create from their 4-H project learning.

ANIMALS

10110 Animal Science - An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows the learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of any animal is not required.

10120 Veterinary Science - An exhibit that shows learning about keeping



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animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human health interaction, or other learning related to Veterinary Science.

AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

- **10210** Crop Production and Plant Science An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth, soils and soil fertility, or any other learning related to Crop Production and Plant Science.
- **10220 Conservation, Environment, and Sustainability** An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.
- **10222 Entomology** Any exhibit that shows learning from an entomology or bee project (excluding live specimens) that is an outgrowth or an entomology or bee project learning experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.
- **10224 Fish and Wildlife** Any exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and



who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs (including Russian/European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

- **10226 Forestry -** Any exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.
- **10230 Horticulture and Plant Science -** An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department under 4-H Livestock.)
- **10235** Home Grounds Improvement An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.
- **10240 Outdoor Adventures -** An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking, or other outdoor activities.
- **10250 Safety and Education in Shooting Sports - An** exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows.)
- 10260 Other Agriculture and Natural Resources An exhibit that shows



learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Department 18 CREATIVE ARTS Superintendent: Ruth Deutmeyer Nancy Shover, Diane Koch, Tanja Foster, Nancy Appleton, Kathy Zimmerman

All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Delaware County 4-H Conference Project Rules. Up to three exhibits may be entered in a class if the exhibits represent different goals and learning. Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements that will be included in the judging process. Members are highly encouraged go to http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/ to find information about judging criteria for exhibits that they create from their 4-H project learning.

- **10310 Music -** An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.
- **10320 Photography** An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

Photography Special Rules:

- 1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. They may be processed from negatives, slides, or digital cameras and computer manipulation programs. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
- 2. Photographs should be a minimum of 5"x7". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11"x14". Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
- 3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted.
- 4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
 - 4-H'ers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size. Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
- 5. Non-mounted photos may be exhibited in a clear plastic covering.
- 6. A series is a group of photographs [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-bystep story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6"x8".
- 7. Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
- 8. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for

- public display in a 4-H setting.
- 9. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
- 10. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
- 11. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography show and vice-versa.
 - **10325 Digital Photography Exhibit Class** A photo or series of photos submitted electronically, not printed. Photos in this class will be submitted, viewed, evaluated, and displayed electronically. Submission will be via upload into the FairEntry data system.

Digital Photography Exhibit Special Rules:

- 1. Photographs may be either black and white or color.
- 2. Photographs will not be printed.
- 3. Entries may be a single photo or a series of photos. A series is a group of photographs (3 to 5) that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Series photo entries must have all photos in the series viewable at the same time.
- 4. Photos entered should be submitted in the highest resolution possible. A finished file size of 1 MB-3 MB is recommended.



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- 5. Photos should be submitted in an acceptable and commonly used format for ease of viewing.
- 6. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- 7. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
- 8. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits. The Photo Exhibit Label may be submitted electronically with the photo entry.
- 9. Photos entered in this class will be evaluated on the same evaluation criteria used for printed photographs.
- 10. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography show and vice-versa.

10340 Creative Photography – A single photograph or photographic image that has been created with an alternative photographic process, or a photograph that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple overlapped photographs.



Creative Photography Special Rules:

- 1. Photograph/Image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.
- 2. Photograph/Image if mounted must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4"x4" and no larger than 10"x10" in height and width. No matting and no framing are allowed, put your creativity into the photography!
- 3. Photograph/Image can be created from film negative, digital negative, or digitally manipulated in computer.
- 4. Photograph must be on photo paper, canvas, or other flat material.
- 5. Exhibit must have Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Include information about the processes used.
- 6. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
 - 10345 Photography Idea/Educational Display An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class includes photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, etc. as part of an educational display showing learning about printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc.
 - 10350 Visual Arts Original Art An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is a one of a kind, non replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art

10355 Visual Arts -Design, Process, or Technique Exploration - This exploration class emphasizes process and provides an individual the opportu-



nity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must still be credited, acknowledged or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5.

10360 Visual Arts - Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics - Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

- 1. Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
- 2. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- 3. If the exhibit is a finished art object information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
- 4. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
- 5. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holderlowner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holderlowner. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Delaware County 4-H Conference Project Rules. Up to three exhibits may be entered in a class if the exhibits represent different goals and learning.

Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements that will be included in the judging process. Members are highly encouraged go to http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/ to find information about judging criteria for exhibits that they create from their 4-H project learning.

- 10410 Child Development An exhibit that shows learning about children. Examples: childcare, growth and development, safety and health, children with special needs, and careers in child development. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit.
- **10420 Clothing and Fashion Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories -** A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.
- **10422** Clothing and Fashion Purchased Garments & Accessories Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.
- **10424** Clothing and Fashion Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

Clothing and Fashion Special Rule:

- 1. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
- 2. Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.
- **10430 Consumer Management** An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, and consumer rights and responsibilities.
- 10440 Food & Nutrition Prepared Product An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared food product. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs Quick Reference Guide" at https://store.

extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding prepared food products.

- 10442 Food & Nutrition Preserved Product An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning & service must include a menu.

Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

- 1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- 3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- ${\it 4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.}$
- 5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- 6. The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- 7. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2020 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used.
- 8. Preserved food exhibits **must** include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
- 9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit: Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc. four (4) to six (6) items. Cakes, loaves, pies, etc. one (1) whole product.
- 10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

10405 - An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, safe activities and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and healthy lifestyle choices.
10406 Home Improvement - An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

Home Improvement Special Rule:

Items entered must be ready for display in the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing

10470 Sewing and Needle Arts – Constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, or other items. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

Special Exhibition - \$10 MEAL CHALLENGE

- **10490 \$10 Meal Challenge** Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving of each of the five food groups for each person. Information regarding food groups and recommended daily servings can be found on the USDA MyPlate website www.choosemyplate.gov. *Special Rules:*
- 1. Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class.
- 2. All entries will receive an evaluation and participation ribbon.
- 3. Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
- 4. The meal must serve a family of four (4) people and total expense on receipt must not exceed \$10.
- 5. The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5)

Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/ movie/video.
 - **10560 Leadership** An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

ing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems. (Note: vehicles will be on display at the Iowa State Fair one day only, Thursday August 12.)

10614 Electric – Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 Small Engine – Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 Tractor – Repaired or restored tractor (or educational display showing learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety. Note: A conference judging opportunity for exhibitors of repaired or restored tractors in class 10616 will be offered during exhibit check-in. (Conference judging may not be available during all check-in times) Tractors will be displayed outside throughout the Iowa State Fair. Release time Sunday, August 22, after 7:00 p.m.)

10618 Welding – Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

10620 Woodworking - Any exhibit that shows learning about wood, wood-

DEPARTMENT 23 – 4-H'ers in Action COUNTY ONLY CLASS

- This special class is separate from the 4-H photography department. Photos will be entered at the information table at conference judging and will not be evaluated as photography exhibits. Each 4-H member may enter one photo and photos will be displayed in a special exhibition area in the 4-H building during the county fair. This is a non-State Fair class. Pictures may be displayed for a time at the Extension Office and used in county 4-H promotions.
- **00601 4-H'ers in Action!** Any 5"x7" color photograph (vertical or horizontal), taken after January 1, 2018, that shows a 4-H'er or group of 4-H'ers involved in an activity. Photos should reflect any aspect of 4-H throughout the year. (Because photos may be selected for an exhibition on the county level, negatives or digital copies of the photos should be kept on file.) Include a photo story (limited to 75 words or less) to tell what's happening in the photo.

4-H Foodstand Charge Account Policy


The Delaware County 4-H Friends of the Foodstand Committee and the ISU Extension and Outreach Delaware County Extension Council have agreed upon the following policies regarding charge accounts during the Delaware County Fair at the 4-H Foodstand:

- 1. Charge accounts may be set up at the ISU Extension and Outreach Delaware County Office after June 1st each year. Account holders are required to set up their account each year.
- 2. Accounts must be set up by an adult 18 or older.
- 3. Accounts are for current 4-H families and volunteers only.
- 4. Invoices will be mailed to the address provided when setting up the account following the Delaware County Fair.
- 5. The ISU Extension and Outreach Delaware County Office will be responsible for collecting all payments.
- 6. Invoices are to be paid to the Delaware County Extension Office via cash or check in a timely manner. As of Sept. 1st, a \$2 per month service charge will be added to late payments.
- 7. All accounts must be paid in full by November 1st.
- 8. If an account is not paid by November 1st, the account holder will lose charging privileges immediately and for one year after full payment is received.

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
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

Delaware County Fair Royalty Competition Rules and Regulations Contest Director: Brittney Carroll

- 1. Each contestant must be at least 16 years of age and not more than 21 years of age on the first day of the 2021 Iowa State Fair, August 12, 2021.
- 2. Contestants must never have been married or have had children. Royalty must not get married, become pregnant, nor have children during their reign.
- 3. The Delaware County Fair Royalty must reside in Delaware County or an adjoining county if the majority of the contestant's activities take place in Delaware County (adjoining counties include: Buchanan, Clayton, Dubuque, Fayette, Jones, and Linn).
- 4. Each contestant must be an active member of at least one service organization in their community such as a church group, National Honor Society, Student Council, Girl/Boy Scouts, 4-H, FFA, etc. If there is a question on the eligibility of the contestant's particular organization, it will be at the discretion of the fair manager to decide if the contestant is eligible.
- 5. No professional model (one who has had ongoing employment in which modeling was the primary part of the job) is eligible to compete in the state competition.
- 6. Any contestant who has competed in the Iowa State Fair Queen Contest may not compete again. Anyone who was selected as the Delaware County Fair Queen or King may not compete again. A contestant who was selected as the Delaware County Fair Princess (First Runner-Up) may compete if she has not competed in the Iowa State Fair Queen Contest.
- 7. It is the responsibility of each contestant to make arrangements of transportation to all activities. This includes the royalty contest and workshop, Delaware County Fair, parades, Iowa State Fair, etc.
- 8. The Delaware County Fair Queen will be a guest of the Iowa State Fair Tuesday through the time of the crowning on Saturday during the week Iowa State Fair.
- 9. A competent committee will select the Delaware County Fair Royalty. Judging will be based on the following: Personality, Attitude, Application, Manners, Public Speaking Ability, Social Skills, Appearance and Awareness; Leadership and Citizenship Contribution to Community; Overall Appearance, Charm, and Poise.
- 10. Each contestant should be prepared to appear in a variety of dress such as business attire, casual and formal wear. On the night of the coronation a formal outfit must be worn such as a prom dress (females) or a dress shirt and dress slacks (males). Tea length or longer dresses would be appreciated for females. Royalty must wear respectable and acceptable clothing while representing the fair. Please see "Clothing Expectations" sheet in the application packet. If clothing is deemed inappropriate you


will be asked to change.

- 11. The female winner of the county competition will be crowned the "Delaware County Fair Queen." The first runner—up will be crowned the "Delaware County Fair Princess." The winning male will be crowned "Delaware County Fair King." The Queen, King, and Princess will be required to attend the Delaware County Fair and associated events for the remaining time of the 2021 fair. The winners of the county competition must agree to appear for the Delaware County Fair Board in official capacities as requested throughout the year until their successors are crowned. This includes, but is not limited to daily appearances at the 2021 fair and the first days at the 2022 fair as well as parades during the summer of 2022.
- 12. The winning contestants will receive all the prizes at the conclusion of their reign.
- 13. Should the Delaware County Fair Queen become ineligible before the Iowa State Fair Queen competition, she will forfeit her title and crown. It will be awarded to the Delaware County Fair Princess and she will compete for the Iowa State Fair Queen.
- 14. Royalty must refrain from any and all illegal activities. Illegal types of behavior, such as drug use and alcohol consumption, will not be tolerated and will be grounds for recall. Smoking, by a legal aged person, will only be tolerated in private settings, never in a public location or on the fairgrounds. We would prefer if royalty did not smoke.
- 15. Royalty must follow requests given to them by the fair manager, the fair manager's assistants, contest directors, or members of the fair board. If there is any question or confusion, talk directly with the fair manager or royalty contest directors.
- 16. The 2021 Delaware County Fair Royalty must be able to attend the entire 2021 Delaware County Fair. The 2022 Delaware County Fair Royalty must be able to attend Monday-Friday of the 2022 Delaware County fair to assist during the fair and crown their successors.
- 17. Royalty must wear their crown and sash while they are in the public eye at the Delaware County Fair. This begins when you arrive at the fair until after the nightly progressive drawing. If you are participating in other events (such as 4-H or FFA shows), please follow their particular dress code rules. Often time, crowns and sashes are not permitted during shows and other functions.
- 18. Significant others will not be permitted to show affection or other similar behavior during the fair or other fair related functions. Your actions portray an image of our fair to the public.
- 19. Royalty must follow the rules of the Delaware County Fair.
- 20. Application packets and information may be picked up from the Delaware County Fair Office located in the Delaware County Community Center or found online at www.delawarecofair.com or www.delawarecofairroyalty.

webs.com.

- 21. Contact Brittney Carroll (brittneycarroll08@gmail.com or 563-920-4575) with any questions concerning the contest. Phone, text, or email are all appropriate forms of communication if any contestant has questions at any time prior to the contest and during fair week.
- 22. The royalty contest will take place on Wednesday, June 23, 2021 at the Delaware County Community Center.
- 23. Royalty Coronation will take place the evening of Friday, July 16, 2021 during the Delaware County Fair.
- 24. Materials and applications are due to the Delaware County Fair Office located in the Delaware County Community Center, or emailed to brittney carroll08@gmail.com by 6:30 pm on Monday, June 14, 2021.
- 25. Applicants seeking assistance or guidance in interview skills, speech preparation, clothing recommendations, etc. are allowed and encouraged to reach out to pageant director, Brittney Carroll, prior to the event. A workshop will be held prior to the contest on at 6:00 pm on Monday, June 14, 2021 at the Delaware County Community Center. This workshop is highly encouraged, but not required

1st, 2nd and 3rd placings will be awarded blue, red and white ribbons plus premium money. If only one entry in category judge may award as they see fit. First place will be awarded only if deserving.

Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit- "Refer to Extension hand-out"

Apples — Slightly polished.

Beans — Leave ½ inch of stem on pod. Uniform in color, straight and same length.

Beets — Trim tops $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches long. Trim roots to 2 inches. Do not scrub. Brush to remove dirt. $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches in diameter.

Broccoli — Remove all leaves below head. Minimum diameter of head is 3 inches. Minimum length of stalk and head is 5 inches. Heads firm; tight bud stage.

Cabbage — Do not peel excessively. 1 to 2 outer leaves to be left on. Trim close to head.

Carrots — Trim tops to 1 to 1½ inch length. Do not scrub. 1 to 1½ inch in diameter at crown.

Cauliflower — Leave stem 1 to 1½ inches long. Trim jacket leaves even with top of head. Some of older leaves may be removed.

Cucumbers — Leave stems ½ inch long. Wipe clean with soft cloth. Size: Pickling, 2 to 3 inches; Dill, 3 to 5 inches; Slicing, 6 to 8 inches.

Dill — Cut seed heads with 10 to 12 inch stems. Exhibit two heads tied near lower end of stems. And again just below seed heads.

Eggplant — Do not wash. Leave 1 inch of stem. Light thumb pressure will leave a dent at proper harvest stage. Small blossom scar. Fresh green calyx.

Herbs — Rinse in cold water. Exhibit 4 to 6 inch sprigs in narrow bottles filled with water. 2 springs or stems per bottle.

Kohlrabi — Cut leaves to within 1 to 2 inches of stem, which is 1½ to 3 inches



in diameter. Light green color. Do not trim roots too closely.

Lettuce, leaf — Fresh, crisp, well colored leaves. Exhibit plant in water to prevent wilting. Remove older outer leaves that show yellowing.

Onions — Do not wash. Leave tops 1 inch above bulb. Trim roots to ¼ inch. Remove only loose skins on outside.

Onions — Green – Remove loose skin. Cut tops 4 to 5 inches above white shank. Parsnips — Trim tops to 1 inch length. Trim off side roots, but do not trim off lower portions of tap root.

Peas — Pick with stem. Rinse with cool water to clean. Bright green, well-filled pods with seeds in eating stage.

Peas (edible pod) — Pick with stem. Wipe off dirt with soft brush. Bright green, tender, flat pods with seed just beginning to form.

Peppers — Leave stem $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 inch long.

Potatoes — Do not wash. Wipe off dirt with soft cloth or brush.

Radishes — Roots are 1 inch in diameter. Gently wash in cool water. Remove discolored or injured leaves. Trim down tops, leaving 1 to 2 inches.

Rhubarb — Pull, do not cut stalks. Trim leaves so only 1 inch of leaf blade remains attached to stalk.

Squash — Cut with 2 inches of stem attached. Do not wash. Clean with soft brush. Zucchini type should be 4 to 8 inches long. Flat or scalloped types should be 3 to 5 inches in diameter. Rind should be soft in summer squash; hard and glossy in winter squash.


Tomatoes — Remove stems. Clean with soft cloth.

Turnips — Cut tops back 1 to 2 inches. Leave 2 inches of tap root. Do not scrub.


